They will have become acquainted with key Christian beliefs and their historical development and will be able to independent- ly analyse and describe them. Familiar with essential concepts of, and types of argument used in, theological ethics, students will be able to take their own position on selected problems in ethics. They will also be able to situate issues relating to Christian beliefs and our ethical responsibility as Christians within the larger context of Christian faith.
