<b>Contents</b>		
<p>Theory and current research:  This module precisely establishes and compares the fundamental strands of 20th-century literary and cultural theory. The main emphasis is on Marxist approaches, structuralism, poststructuralism, psychoanalysis, feminism, intertextuality, the aesthetics of reception, discourse theory, new historicism and cultural materialism. On this basis, the module then introduces selected approaches and debates that have shaped and transformed English Studies during the last 40 years. These will be put to use and exemplified in sophisticated analyses of concrete texts and phenomena. In the process, at least one of the following fields of research is accentuated: gender and queer studies; subcultural studies; postcolonial studies; globalization studies; performance studies; human/animal studies and environmental humanities; system theory or actor-network theory; theories of affect.</p>		
<b>Intended learning outcomes</b>		
<p>By successfully participating in the module students are enabled to read and understand theoretical texts and to situate them in the wider debate of literary and cultural studies. They learn to explain, critically reflect on and abstract from complex questions, models, methods, terminologies and theories in literary and cultural studies. They also learn to use these theories in their own work and research and to critically gauge their relevance and operational value.</p>
