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Content and Objectives of the Programme

The M.A.-programme in Egyptology is offered a research oriented programme. Its aim is to introduce the student to an in-depth-work with selected topics of Egyptology on an advanced level, to enable him to identify research problems and desiderates and to independently develop solutions on the basis of a sound overview of the ancient Egyptian culture. Through training these capabilities the foundations for a Ph.D. programme in Egyptology are laid.

The M.A.-programme in Egyptology focuses on independent and critical reflection of Egyptological research. Acquiring knowledge in certain fields within Egyptology is conditioned by this goal.

The M.A.-thesis demonstrates that the graduate is able to deal with a thematically limited Egyptological problem within a certain given time span according to the taught methods and according to scholarly standards. He or she has mostly independently written the thesis under limited supervision.

The internationally comparable degree in the field of Egyptology is the second degree within the consecutive Bachelor-Master's programme. Thus it qualifies for the start into a job outside the university. On the other hand it is the typical prerequisite for a ensuing Ph.D.-programme. In a colloquium the graduate has proved to be capable to defend his thesis in a scholarly discussion by applying scholarly methods.

The M.A.-programme in Egyptology typically aims at the profession of an Egyptologist who works in various research institutions, e. g. universities, academies, the German Archaeological Institute or Egyptian museums. To this end the studies for the Master's degree lays foundations for a Ph.D. which qualifies for scholarly work. However, graduates of this programme should also be trained or have skills for further education to work outside academia, e.g. in publishing houses, libraries, cultural management, media, tourism, museology, public relations, diplomatic service.

For an academic career the necessary methodological and Egyptological knowledge is taught in Egyptological modules. Egyptology is a subject which studies a great variety of sources and material remains stretching over 4000 years. Consequently it is impossible to introduce to all specialized fields of the subject equally thoroughly. Therefore in the programme students learn alongside the specialized basic Egyptological competence the methodological capability to make oneself familiar with a new Egyptological topic efficiently and quickly.

Thus the graduate is familiar with and used to the phenomenon of permanent learning, to develop solutions by adequate methods. In addition he or she has a good knowledge in modern foreign languages, be it through courses in the field of key qualifications, be it in Egyptology courses. Students of Egyptology are required to read specialized literature in different languages, particularly in English, French and Italian, i.e. they are familiar to read difficult texts in languages other than their native language, to understand them and to gain the relevant information from them. At the same time they have to express their own findings in German as one of the three major scholarly languages in Egyptology in a differentiated and precise manner. Through this they have developed linguistic flexibility and competence. Finally the graduate has a high degree in initiative and commitment to get sensible and sound information.

On the basis of respective and presuppositional texts, particularities of Egyptian literature (topics, structure, intentions) as well as the related scientific discussion will be covered.

Intended learning outcomes

The objective of the module is that students are familiar in some depth with aspects of the Egyptian history of literature, the topics and contents of Egyptian literature and the issues of Egyptian research concerning the Egyptian literature. Students are able to sum up respective technical literature, to give a lecture on and critically evaluate the state of research concerning certain literary texts. They are able to word issues concerning problems of Egyptian literature independently and to develop and implement solution approaches.
