Graduates of the Master's degree programme History (120 and 45 ECTS credits) will:

 come from all historical epochs and will cover aspects of German, European and World History
 as well as aspects of Comparative Local and Regional History focusing on a predefined region.
- be able to reflect on research results in the field of History, to independently identify research problems and desiderata and to develop solutions drawing on a sound knowledge of the scientific discipline using historical methods.
- be able to impart to others the knowledge of the impact of history on the present and, thereby, make a contribution to their political education and ability to participate in a democratic society.
- have gained the research experience necessary for a possible transfer to a doctoral programme after the award of the Master's degree.
