In addition, a consecutive development of the basics in modern Chinese and the broadening of vocabulary and supplementation of grammatical phenomena by means of intensive written and oral exercises takes place. Further to the acquisition of the basics of the Chinese language, grammatical knowledge is developed in theory and practice and deepened through text analysis. For this purpose, selected texts are used in an exemplary and well-directed manner with respect to the teaching material and a practice-oriented analysis of grammatical language structures is practised. The activation of the ability to express oneself in writing as well as specific translation exercises into Chinese pursue the goal of applying and consolidating the grammatical phenomena acquired and strengthening of translation skills, especially from German into Chinese.

Intended learning outcomes

Students have a systematic text-oriented knowledge of basic grammatical structures, basic translation skills, the ability to reproduce texts that are related to the teaching material in terms of content and style, and the ability to formulate sentence structures independently. Furthermore, they have a listening comprehension oriented to the teaching material. The vocabulary is based on a knowledge of approximately 700 characters.

The focus is on oral communication and the teaching of everyday language. A special focus is placed on language situations that are of particular relevance at the beginning of the compulsory semester abroad in Beijing. Passive and active language skills are practised on the basis of the modules SB1-3 in a situation-specific manner. The first part of the module is held in a two-week crash course before the start of the regular lecture period of the winter semester. In the accreditability procedure, a summer language course in the PRC organised and supervised by Würzburg and the ECLC office at PKU can be recognised instead of the crash course in Würzburg. The second part of the module is a semester course.

Intended learning outcomes

Students acquire speaking skills suitable for everyday use. The focus is on oral communication. Students are able to understand and respond appropriately to everyday situations within the framework of their vocabulary and the language structures practised in the textbooks.

The compulsion competer at Poking University, which is coordinated evaluated and assembly included by local tea					

The compulsory semester at Peking University, which is coordinated, evaluated and accompanied by local teachers, serves to intensify language training as well as to activate linguistic knowledge. The confrontation with a number of other native speakers as teachers as well as the linguistic environment in Beijing places linguistic competence in all fields (spoken language, written expression, reading competence) on a broad basis. A systematic repetition of grammatical phenomena is used to deepen the knowledge. The modules within the framework of the compulsory semester abroad in the fourth semester take place exclusively at Peking University. For this purpose, teaching material has been designed that takes the current social, cultural and regional context substantially into account. On the basis of exercises, learning contents are intensified. All grammar is intensively repeated and specifically completed from the perspective of Chinese linguistics. The written skills are intensified through regular essay training.

Intended learning outcomes

Students reach the advanced level of language acquisition. They are able to develop natural texts in addition to the teaching material. They are also able to adequately present everyday life and general questions independently in texts with medium length (approximately 1000 characters).

The module covers three thematic contents, dealing with complex texts, technical language skills and advanced colloquial language. The language competence that the students have acquired in the 4th semester at Peking University is broadened. The students' reading skills are deepened by using selected texts that are characterised by specific content and style, as well as communicative practice of culture and subject-specific vocabulary. Further areas of competence are: reading and writing official documents as well as understanding formal texts; the passive and active dealing with official documents in the form of different text types is practised. Official language as well as forms of politeness are passively taught in various written contexts and actively practised.

Intended learning outcomes

The ability to develop stylistically more demanding texts and to discuss them in communicative exercises is practised. The ability to express oneself in writing with subject-specific vocabulary and appropriate written expression is practised. The students are able to present complex topics in Chinese.

The module continues the three thematic contents, the scope with complex texts, technical language competences as well as advanced colloquial language from the fifth language semester. Topics from cultural, economic and social areas with relevance to current affairs are chosen by the lecturers. Thematic presentations and the appropriate presentation of opinions and contributions are practised. Advanced elements of oral skills such as idioms and figures of speech are introduced and practised. In the area of technical language, the use of media language is broadened and deepened. News, articles and advertisements in written and oral form from different media such as newspapers, radio, television and the Internet are analysed as examples. The understanding of media language and the ability to systematically reproduce media content is practised. Introduction to the use of academic texts, and in relation to this, practice of the basics of oral academic presentation in Chinese.

Intended learning outcomes

Students are able to independently develop and adequately master general language, professional, study-related as well as academic texts with general and subject-related vocabulary of advanced difficulty. They are able to develop complex sentence structures, use subject-specific vocabulary and express themselves appropriately in writing and orally on a variety of cultural and subject-related topics. Independent knowledge of a media-specific vocabulary is achieved.

The module consists of two parts, an "Introduction to Sinology Tools" and an "Introduction to Writing". The introduction to sinological tools and working methods provides students with the basics and possibilities of Western and Chinese-language lexical and digital resources at the beginning of their studies through intensive practice. The "Introduction to Writing" aims to improve practical writing competence, also through intensive practice, as well as to lay the foundations and deepen methodological and theoretical knowledge of Chinese writing. The goal is to link the theory and practice of writing. The module is a compulsory module for first-year students and is therefore aligned with the level of language training in the first Chinese language semester.

Intended learning outcomes

By presenting the appropriate tools and directly practising their use, the students are able to critically consult suitable sinological tools. On the basis of systematic orthographic knowledge and an understanding of central theoretical aspects of Chinese writing, students are able to independently and effectively broaden their own written vocabulary.

The module consists of a lecture on the contemporary history of the People's Republic of China (PRC) and a seminar on Chinese regional studies. The lecture introduces students to the first 40 years of the PRC (1949 to 1989). The regional studies seminar provides knowledge on physical-geographical basics, administrative structures of the PRC, population, regional disparities, social welfare and cultural mechanisms. The module is a compulsory module aimed at first-year students in the first semester.

Intended learning outcomes

Students have a solid knowledge of the political history of the People's Republic of China until 1989 as well as of regional, geographical and ecological facts and fundamental social developments. They are able to classify further topics on contemporary China in this basic structure.

The module consists of two courses within one year. Firstly, it offers an overview of the religions that have culturally shaped China and its East Asian neighbours Korea and Japan. From the third semester onwards, the module offers students access to the language and history of Japan. The focus is on Japan's interaction with China and other neighbouring countries in East Asia. In the Japanese crash course, students are first provided with the basics of the Japanese language, which can be expanded upon, by drawing on previously acquired knowledge of the Chinese language. In addition to basic grammar structures and vocabulary, this includes the active and passive use of the writing systems. In particular, technical training is given in the communication and research-oriented pronunciation of Sino-Japanese terms with reference to China. Apart from a compact chronological overview regarding the history of Japan, the module offers an introduction to cultural, economic and political contacts with mainland Asia and the West since the 19th century.

Intended learning outcomes

Students are able to independently classify events in Japanese history chronologically and thematically. They have the basic knowledge of independent and in-depth familiarisation with further questions of historical and current contacts between China and Japan.

The module consists of the courses "Intercultural Competence China" and "Digital Resources", which are taken in the third and sixth semester. The courses address specific needs of the students at the respective time of study. The block seminar "Intercultural Competence China" consists of a theory-oriented and a practice-oriented part. The first part provides the students with the theoretical basics of intercultural communication, its application to China as well as China's cultural and regional studies. In the second part, case studies are used to work out and analyse communication problems in different areas of German-Chinese cooperation. The exercise "Digital Resources" imparts basic knowledge of Chinese EDP for the preparation of academic papers and for the use of digital resources. It also introduces the use of digital resources during the collection of primary data and the creation of statistics and databases for integration into academic papers, especially the Bachelor's thesis.

Intended learning outcomes

Students are able to recognise and interpret intercultural characteristics and differences between China and Germany. They find solutions for characteristic intercultural problems. They are able to use digital resources independently and process collected data material. They are able to carry out bibliographic research and use it for seminar papers and the Bachelor thesis.
