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Content and Objectives of the Programme

The Master's Program in Philosophy prepares students for scholarly research in the field of philosophy. The program provides in-depth familiarization with philosophical theories in the areas of theoretical and practical philosophy, a comprehensive understanding of philosophical methods, and a firm knowledge of the history of philosophy. It enables young scholars to deal independently with problems in the areas of research, teaching, and cultural praxis. Students master the research-oriented discourses in contemporary and historical philosophy and learn to apply their knowledge to specific philosophical problems. During this process, they receive extensive guidance in the independent planning and execution of scholarly research projects, focusing on the skills of evaluation of results, presentation, and interpretation.

The award of the title Master of Arts certifies that the recipient has earned an internationally recognized degree testifying to a deep and broad knowledge of systematic, historical, and methodological problems in the field of philosophy. In the final paper (Master's thesis), the student can show that he or she is capable of doing independent scholarly work on a thematically and historically specific problem in philosophy, using accepted scholarly methods or some variation on those methods.

At the end of his or her course of study, the successful Master's candidate receives a formal qualification equivalent to a title of Magister artium or Magistra artium. On passing the final Master's examinations, the candidate is entitled to proceed to a course of study leading to the award of a Ph.D.
