Content and Objectives of the Programme

The Master programme Indology/South Asia Studies (credit of 120 ECTS) builds on the corresponding Bachelor main subject programme. It is preliminary to studies for the degree of Dr. phil. in Indology / South Asia Studies and to scientific activities in a wide range of career areas. The aim of the training is to obtain deeper knowledge of scientific work in research and application of Indology / South Asia Studies and the subject matter with which they are concerned. The aim of the programme is to lead to deeper knowledge of selected important subdisciplines of Indology / South Asia Studies and also to go further into subject-specific methods. Here the reinforcement of skills in a classical or modern South Asian language, as a rule Sanskrit or Hindi, is the most important element in ensuring the quality of the training. Individual thematic emphases are selected from within the large framework of the intellectual and cultural history of India from late antiquity through the classical period and up to the present. In particular, a variety of aspects of Hinduism, which is still of great influence in modern society, will be treated from philological, religio-historical and ethnological points of view.

The knowledge of languages, culture, history and social structures imparted by the Master programme Indology / South Asian Studies is supplemented by study or field research periods in India in which students can find practical application for the skills they have acquired.

Students continue to develop the capacity acquired during Bachelor studies of adapting learned working methods quickly to current tasks. Academic, social and communicative competences are extended considerably, opening up numerous new career opportunities. In addition, the Master programme lays particular emphasis on introducing students to subject-specific academic research work, thus preparing the way to continuing studies for a doctorate.

It is to be expected that the range of opportunities particularly open to Asiatic specialists with cultural sciences training and in-depth language and regional knowledge will widen considerably in the coming years. Primary career fields for graduates in Indology / South Asia Studies are scientific work at universities or in academic libraries and museums with Oriental sections or Asiatic collections. Academic and research fields thus form the most important career area for the best graduates. For graduates with very good linguistic and regional knowledge combined with skills in imparting intercultural competence, the door is also open to university assistantships. A further possibility is a career in the diplomatic service or in internationally active cultural organisations (e.g. the Goethe Institute). Alongside these there is a wide spectrum of opportunities: these include, for example, higher positions in German enterprises operating in India or in organisations for economic cooperation (e.g. German-Indian Chamber of Commerce). There are also opportunities in culture management, intercultural training, in aid organisations and in institutes for technical or development cooperation.
