## Learning Outcomes

### Academic qualification

- Graduates possess sound methodological and subject-specific knowledge in Biblical, Historical, Systematic, and Practical Theology. They are able to identify, reflect upon, and integrate interdisciplinary interfaces into their academic work - particularly with the humanities, social sciences, and human sciences.
- Graduates are capable of perceiving, analysing, and critically reflecting upon processes of transformation in pluralistic societies on the basis of theoretical and methodological frameworks. On this basis, they are able to revise, modify, and develop theological concepts.
- Graduates are qualified to engage independently with the challenges posed by religious and societal transformation processes. They can apply and further develop acquired knowledge in a reflective, methodologically sound, and practice-oriented manner.
- Graduates are familiar with historical and contemporary processes of transformation and the challenges associated with them. They are able to transfer substantive and methodological approaches to other transformative contexts.
- Graduates are able to critically engage with the historical entanglements of theology and colonialism and to analyse their lasting impact on theological concepts and ecclesial structures. They are familiar with postcolonial approaches in theology and can develop their own perspectives for a contextual, decolonial, and justice-oriented theology in global dialogue.
- Graduates understand the global challenges of our time and the principles of sustainability, taking into account ecological, social, and economic dimensions, including the Sustainable Development Goals and the concept of planetary boundaries. They are able to develop and critically reflect upon scientifically grounded approaches to global and regional sustainability challenges.
- Graduates are able to critically analyse complex religious, ethical, and socio-political issues, contribute theological perspectives to interdisciplinary discourses, and develop well-founded positions that support individual and collective processes of orientation.
- Graduates can analyse historical and contemporary upheavals in Church and society and assess their reciprocal influences. They are able to reflect upon theological and ethical interpretations of crises, reform processes, and transformations and to develop perspectives for responsible ecclesial and societal engagement in shaping the future.
- Graduates are able to reflect upon the significance of rituals as expressions of identity and community, to interpret rituals in their respective contexts, and to design them creatively in response to the challenges and needs of a changing world.
- Graduates are familiar with analysing the complex interactions between religion and politics in both historical and contemporary contexts. They can reflect upon the role of religious ideologies, institutions, and movements in political processes and critically contribute theological perspectives to political discourses. They have developed practice-oriented approaches to addressing ethical issues at the intersection of religion and politics.
- Graduates are familiar with various international formats of religious education, understand their contextual relevance, and are able to design religious learning and educational processes in a context-sensitive manner. In particular, they are qualified to understand, profile, and initiate religious education as a resource for engaging with transformation processes.

### Ability to take up skilled employment

- Graduates are oriented towards interdisciplinary and international professional fields requiring theological expertise and are able to transfer theoretical knowledge into practice-oriented contexts. They can critically reflect upon their theological and methodological competences and

the diverse fields of application of their expertise within societal, cultural, and political transformation processes.

- Graduates possess the methodological and analytical prerequisites for independent research in theology and related interdisciplinary fields such as religious studies, ethics, political theology, or transformation studies. They are qualified to work in universities, research institutes, or application-oriented institutions and are prepared to pursue further academic qualification through doctoral studies.
- Graduates are qualified for demanding professional fields both within and beyond ecclesial and theological contexts. This includes careers in academia and research, interreligious dialogue, policy advice, NGOs, media, cultural management, and education.
- Graduates are able to familiarise themselves with new, interdisciplinary topics with the help of specialist literature, empirical data and international sources. You will be able to independently analyse complex problems in accordance with the rules of good scientific practice, develop well-founded solutions and present your findings in a reflective and differentiated manner.
- They are able to present theological, ethical and social issues in a structured, comprehensible manner appropriate to the target audience. They can communicate their knowledge in interdisciplinary and intercultural contexts and defend it confidently using sound argumentation and rhetoric.
- They can address sustainability issues in an interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary manner and combine different perspectives in a goal-oriented way.

- Graduates are able to critically reflect upon their own religious and worldview-based convictions and to communicate appropriately about questions of faith and meaning in a pluralistic and globalised society. - You will have sound ethical and theological skills enabling you to analyse current religious, ecclesiastical, political and social transformation processes in a differentiated manner. You will be able to take a well-founded position and make informed contributions to the debate on social justice, ecological responsibility, technologisation and political conflicts.
- They are able to navigate an increasingly complex world, combine theological perspectives with insights from other disciplines in the humanities, social sciences and natural sciences, and use this foundation to develop their own value-oriented approach to thinking and acting.

They critically examine power structures, ethical dilemmas and transformation dynamics and are involved in responsible decision-making processes for a fairer and more sustainable world.

<p>The pluralization and functional differentiation of societies in Europe, America and the western world is a central phenomenon of social modernization. This gives rise to both development opportunities and challenges for these societies, for state and church actors and for people in their private lives. The mere coexistence of specific knowledge resources and validity claims of different social actors and service providers creates an ambivalent situation, which is characterized on the one hand by a deepening and specialization of knowledge, but on the other hand by relativization and mutual separation as well as competition. Theological sciences work with this social and ecclesiastical situation in mind. They must critically analyze the hermeneutical statements and the practice of the churches and other religious providers according to criteria of plurality and differentiation theory and think about ways of a theology that is capable of modernity.</p>		
<b>Intended learning outcomes</b>		
<p>Students are familiar with central modernization developments and will be able to analyze their effects on the church and society. Furthermore, they will have learnt to develop theology under the conditions of social pluralization and differentiation in accordance with the situation and tradition.</p>

<p>The module offered by different lecturers - possibly also in an interdisciplinary manner - introduces various methodological and hermeneutical approaches used in theology and its subdisciplines, with a particular emphasis on approaches that contribute to encompass processes of social transformation. Through the lens of intersectional and postcolonial perspectives, among others, this module reveals Christian theology as a globally relevant academic discipline engaged in interdisciplinary dialogue and discourse.</p>		
<b>Intended learning outcomes</b>		
<p>Upon completion of this module, students will have gained an understanding of Christian theology (in the areas of biblical, historical, systematic, and practical theology) as a multi-perspective discipline that engages with contemporary social developments and pressing issues through a methodically reflective and interdisciplinary approach. By building on their new insights, they will be able to sharpen their understanding of theology and further develop their methodological knowledge.</p>

<p>In a (religiously) pluralistic world characterized by multiple crises, the conditions and standards for right action and models of a good life are increasingly being questioned. For this reason, a theology geared towards transformation processes is dependent on critical ethical reflection. The basis for this is knowledge of ethical theories of justification and models of ethical judgment. Building on the reflection of the moral subject in its relationships, possibilities of living together and assuming responsibility are discussed. This is done by linking fundamental ethical considerations with concrete problems from the field of ethics (e.g. bioethics, peace ethics, digitalization).</p>		
<b>Intended learning outcomes</b>		
<p>Students will be able to use central concepts, methods and models of theological ethics to analyze ethical areas of conflict in a differentiated manner and to develop theologically responsible positions. They will be able to form ethical judgments and critically assess moral-theological arguments, relate them to other ideological patterns of interpretation and, on this basis, deal with exemplary challenges in a world characterized by transformation processes.</p>

Students are introduced to the interaction of transformation processes in society and theology through adequate examples from the history of the ancient Mediterranean.</p>

<p>At the end of the seminar, students will have become familiar with important transformations in ancient societies which produced theological innovations. They will have developed an awareness of specific sociocultural realities in selected ancient societies. They will have developed the ability to reflect in-depth on the effects of processes of crisis, reform and transformation upon theological thought and present them adequately.</p>

<p>The module focuses on dealing with the challenges of transforming contemporary societies. Students gain access to ethical theories on the one hand and to the analysis of specific societal problems on the other. The changing topics touch on different dimensions of social plurality (socio-economic, cultural, etc.) and students learn to recognize and name ethical problems in these contexts and to give reasons to ethical judgments.</p>		
<b>Intended learning outcomes</b>		
<p>Students will be able to perceive, analyze and reflect on transformation processes in pluralistic societies in a theory- and method-oriented manner. They will be able to critically analyze socio-political issues, introduce socio-ethical perspectives into interdisciplinary discourses and develop their own well-founded positions. In this way, they acquire the ability to actively participate in social processes and discourses and to engage in responsible decision-making processes for a fairer and more sustainable world. They have the ability to take responsibility for their own actions as well as for social and institutional processes, particularly in intercultural, political and ethical decision-making fields.</p>

<p>The module offers an introduction to post- and decolonial theories, introduces controversial discourses and provides access to the reception of post- and decolonial theories in theology. In addition, the colonial imprint of theology itself becomes the subject matter and the handling of the colonial legacy of the church is reflected upon. This discussion takes place from the perspective of different theological disciplines and can be concretized on various topics.</p>		
<b>Intended learning outcomes</b>		
<p>Students are familiar with important contemporary theoretical approaches (post- and decolonial studies) and will be able to classify and critically reflect on them. They will be able to recognize, name and analyze (post-)colonial effects and mechanisms within theology and the church and are sensitized to power criticism. In this way, they acquire the skills to analyze current religious, ecclesiastical, political and social transformation processes in a differentiated manner in this respect. They will be able to take a well-founded position and make reflective contributions to the debate on how to deal with the colonial legacy. The module makes a particular contribution to (inter)cultural sensitivity.</p>

<p>The module comprises an in-depth seminar offered by different lecturers - possibly also in an interdisciplinary manner - on the range of topics "Upheavals in church and society in the past and present". The alternating topics relate to ecclesiastical and social crises and processes of upheaval from different eras as well as their impact on religious and theological discourses. The transformative potential of these discourses is examined from a historical and sociological perspective. In each instance, the focus is on analyzing the complex interactions between religion and politics, society and the environment.</p>		
<b>Intended learning outcomes</b>		
<p>Students will be able to situate and analyze theologically and religiously mediated transformation processes of pluralistic societies from a historical perspective and use this as a starting point to productively combine historical-theological reflections with current social and ecclesiastical developments and communicate these in an appropriate way. They will have the ability to critically and reflectively analyze sources.</p>
