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Content and Objectives of the Programme

The Bachelor secondary subject Greek Philology is an option within Philosophical Faculty I of the JMU as part of a fundamentals-oriented course of studies consisting of one main and one secondary subject. The academic degree obtained is determined by the main subject.

Study of Greek Philology as a Bachelor secondary subject imparts the following particular skills:

- secure comprehension of Classical Greek texts without the use of auxiliary materials
- secure knowledge of Greek grammar
- the ability to interpret Greek texts and their literary models on the basis of scientific research and to place them in their historical, cultural and social context

The Bachelor examination is the means of establishing whether the candidate has gained an overview of the fundamental structures within Greek Philology and possesses the ability to apply the scientific methods used.

Success in the Bachelor examination satisfies, within the JMU's subject-specific Master programme regulations in the relevant version applying in each case, the entry requirements for a Master programme.
