

Der Studiengang ist ein "Theologisches Vollstudium" (1-Fach, 5 Jahre, 300 ECTS) gemäß Nr. 3 der "Eckpunkte für die Studienstruktur in Studiengängen mit Katholischer oder Evangelischer Theologie/Religion" (Beschluss der Kultusministerkonferenz vom 13.12.2007). Das Studiengangkonzept entspricht den von der Deutschen Bischofskonferenz vorgelegten "Kirchliche[n] Anforderungen an die Modularisierung des Studiums der Katholischen Theologie (Theologisches Vollstudium) im Rahmen des Bologna-Prozesses" vom 8. März 2006 (in der Fassung vom 21. Juni 2016) auf der Grundlage der "Rahmenordnung für die Priesterbildung" vom 12. März 2003 und deren Vorgaben ergänzend. Der Abschluss Magister/ Magistra Theologiae ist ein kanonischer Grad im Sinne von Art. 47 § 1 der Apostolischen Konstitution "Sapientia Christiana" vom 29. April 1979 in Verbindung mit Nr. 17 des "Akkommodationsdekrets I" vom 1. Januar 1983.

Theological anthropology and the doctrine of creation. Old and New Testament foundations and their development in theological tradition. The *Schöpfungstheologie* (Theology of Creation) lecture is dogmatically oriented and discusses the concept of the world as the creation of God in the context of topical interdisciplinary problems and trinitarian theories; in addition, it provides a systematic analysis of the related Christian understanding of the human person. The systematic opinions and definitions of Christian tradition are discussed in the context of modern natural and human sciences and the implications for our need to take responsibility for human life considered. The section on philosophical anthropology reflects upon the Christian understanding of the human person, taking alternative understandings of the human person that exist within intellectual and cultural history into consideration. A particular focus is on the challenges posed by a naturalistic understanding of the human person. Courses: Old Testament anthropology and the doctrine of creation; New Testament anthropology; the theology of creation; fundamental problems in medical ethics; philosophical anthropology. Module assessment will either be held under the responsibility and in special consideration of the subject of Old Testament or the subject of dogmatics; assessment will cover all courses of the module.

Intended learning outcomes

At the end of the course, students will have developed the ability to distinguish between different biblical views of creation and the human person and to situate them within a context. They will have become familiar with the key structural elements of the Christian understanding of the world and the human person. Students will be able to reflect upon issues in philosophy and the natural sciences in contemporary interdisciplinary debate in the context of the trinitarian doctrine of creation. In addition, students will be familiar with how we as Christians have to take responsibility for human life in the face of the challenges posed by medicine and biotechnology.

This module discusses the doctrine of God from biblical, philosophical, and systematic points of view. It uses the Old Testament to illustrate Israel's way towards monotheism. Gospels, epistles, and the Book of Acts are sources for New Testament God-talk. The philosophical doctrine of God explores the contribution and importance of philosophical reflection to the Christian understanding of God. In this context, the module also discusses more recent approaches to, and debates in, religious philosophy. The systematic doctrine of God develops the treatise of Trinity on the basis of scripture, tradition, and magisterium and highlights its relevance to our current understanding of the world and the challenges that face us today. Courses: God and gods: Israel's way towards monotheism; biblical concepts of God in the New Testament; the dogmatic doctrine of God; the question about God and the challenges of the present; the philosophical doctrine of God. Module assessment will either be held under the responsibility and in special consideration of the subject of philosophy or the subject of fundamental

Intended learning outcomes

At the end of the course, students will be able to trace Israel's way towards monotheism. They will have gained an insight into the richness of New Testament God-talk found in the historical Jesus and the writings of early Christian communities. Students will have become familiar both with issues in the philosophical doctrine of God and with the sources of the systematic doctrine of God. They will be able to evaluate the concept of trinity in the light of our current understanding of the world, the concepts of God in other religions, and the challenges that face us today.

Investigation of problems in early church relating to the faith in Jesus Christ as the Saviour and the Lord, including but not limited to questions about the oneness and the plurality of God and the relationship between God and humankind in Jesus Christ; discussion of the historical development of the debate during the first five centuries AD. Discussion of christology as a reflection on the centre and source of Christian faith in today's religiously plural world; an introduction to the historical Jesus and the Christ of faith. Courses: Old Testament Messianic texts; Jesus of Nazareth; christology in the early Church; christology; the historical Jesus and the Christ of faith. Module assessment will either be held under the responsibility and in special consideration of the subject of New Testament exeges or the subject of Early Church; assessment will cover all courses of the module.

Intended learning outcomes

At the end of the course, students have become familiar with Old Testament Messianic texts as well as New Testament texts about the life and works of Jesus Christ. The richness of Christian spirituality and piety. Discussion of the different forms they have taken throughout history and ways to analyse them in the context of today's society. Insights into theories on the activities of the Church as well as into the different types of Christian community and communication of Christian faith (sacraments, the teaching office and the basic functions of the Church, learning processes in religious education). Courses: historical forms of Christian spirituality; celebrating sacraments; the teaching office of the Church and the law of sacramental initiation; forms of practising faith; religious education in the context of pluralism. Module assessment will either be held under the responsibility and in special consideration of the subject of canon law or the subject of pastoral theology; assessment will cover all courses of the module.

Intended learning outcomes

At the end of the course, students will have gained an insight into the richness of Christian piety and the diverse ways in which Christians live and lived their faith. They will know how they originated and will have become aware of the fact that they arose from prevailing circumstances. Students will have developed an awareness of the fact that the Church today is operating in a society that is characterised by diversity and will have become familiar with relevant norms. In addition, students will have developed the ability to make use of the tensions between norms and situations to spark their own theological and practical creativity.



Looking at the tradition of the magisterium of the Church as well as topical issues, the lecture on the doctrine of the sacraments equips students with a grounding in theoretical perspectives on communication. It discusses the administration of the sacraments in general, and baptism, confirmation, and eucharist in particular, from the points of view of anthropology, christology, and ecclesiology. The lecture on eschatology explains Christian hope in the face of death from the points of view of general and individual eschatology and discusses it based on biblical and magisterial sources. The lecture on missiology discusses our understanding of missionary activity today as well as topical issues in the dialogue of religions.

Intended learning outcomes

At the end of the course, students will have become familiar with the understanding of sacraments as communicative acts and will have developed and awareness of the changes that our understanding of the concept of the sacrament has undergone in the tradition of the magisterium of the Church and the history of theology. They will be able to formulate a theology of baptism, confirmation, and eucharist that is appropriate in contemporary times. In addition, students will have become familiar with key concepts and problems in eschatology, including but not limited to the kingdom of God and contemporary concepts of resurrection. 





The module component focusing on homiletics discusses the communicative aspect of preaching in theory and practice.

They will be able to design their own defined research projects, applying the concepts and methods they have learned. Students will have gained deeper insights into the distinguishing characteristics of the Christian community. In addition, students will have developed an awareness of the communicative aspect of preaching and will have gained proficiency in preaching.





What sets the Catholic theology programme offered by the University of Würzburg apart from programmes offered by other institutions is that it offers deeper insights into regional and eastern church history and also covers topics in ecumenical theology and missiology. 


