The module introduces students to the foundations, manifestations, and forms of expression of antisemitism and explores their significance for teachers. The focus is on central concepts, definitions, and theories in antisemitism research, as well as their relevance for critical education on antisemitism. Students engage with historical and contemporary manifestations of antisemitism, psychosocial motivations, and biographical and societal starting points. In doing so, perceptions, religious socialisation, societal discourses, and learning conditions are considered as relevant factors for critical educational processes on antisemitism. A further focus lies on the perception of the diverse dimensions of Jewish life. In this context, reductions, stereotyping, and problematic representations of Jewish traditions, intra-Jewish plurality, history, and the present are analysed. After participating in the module course, students will be familiar with central definitions, theories, and concepts of antisemitism research and will be able to identify different antisemitic manifestations and forms of expression in a subject-specific manner, as well as assess their relevance for critical education on antisemitism for the Protestant Religious Education at Gymnasium level. They will develop a basic understanding of the psychosocial and societal functions of antisemitism and will be able to critically relate these to school-based and classroom-related learning conditions. Students will be able to reflect on biographical and societal starting points as well as processes of religious socialisation as significant factors for critical educational processes on antisemitism. They will be able to perceive the diverse dimensions of Jewish life in history and the present and critically reflect on representations of Jewish traditions, intra-Jewish plurality, and contemporary Jewish life in teaching materials. Furthermore, students will be able to connect critical education perspectives on antisemitism with profession-related knowledge and formulate implications for their future role as teachers of Protestant Religious Education at Gymnasium level.

Contents		
The seminar introduces students to ethical and anthropological patterns of interpretation and argumentation in religious traditions and examines them from the perspective of the study of religions. On the basis of central historical, theological, philosophical, and contemporary texts, fundamental questions of, for example, Jewish and Christian anthropology, ethics, and ways of life are addressed. In doing so, the seminar takes into account self-understandings, intra-religious plurality, and selected relations to Christian patterns of interpretation.
