Course of Studies - Contents and Objectives

The M.A.-programme in Ancient Near Eastern Studies with the final degree of a Master of Arts is offered as a research programme. Its aim is to introduce the student to an in-depth-work with selected topics of Ancient Near Eastern Studies on an advanced level, to enable him/ her to identify research problems and gaps in scientific research and enable hin/ her to independently develop solutions on the basis of a sound overview of the ancient Near Eastern languages. By training these competences the foundation for a Ph.D. programme in Ancient Near Eastern Studies is laid.

The M.A.-programme in Ancient Near Eastern Studies focuses on independent and critical reflection of Ancient Near Eastern Studies research. The basis is the learning of and earning skills in Ancient Near Eastern languages.

Acquiring knowledge in certain fields within Ancient Near Eastern Studies is conditioned by this aim.

The M.A.-thesis demonstrates that the graduate is able to deal with a thematically limited problem of Ancient Near Eastern Studies within a certain given span of time according to the taught methods and according to scholarly standards. He/ she has mostly independently written the thesis under limited supervision.

The internationally comparable degree in the field of Ancient Near Eastern Studies is the second degree within the consecutive Bachelor-Master's programme. Thus it qualifies for the start into a job outside the university and it is the pre-condition for an ensuing Ph.D.-programme. In a colloquium the graduate has proved his/ her capability to defend his/ her thesis in a scholarly discussion by applying scholarly methods.

The M.A.-programme in Ancient Near Eastern Studies typically aims at the profession of an Assyriologist, Sumerologist or Hittitologist who works in various research institutions, e. g. universities, and academies. For this the studies for the Master's degree lays the foundation for a Ph.D. which qualifies for scholarly work. However, graduates of this programme should also be trained or have skills for further education to work outside academia, e.g. in publishing houses, libraries, diplomatic service, cultural management, media, museology, as well as other/diverse professions demanding general competence skills provided for in this programme of study.

For an academic career the necessary methodological and linguistic knowledge is taught in subject modules. Ancient Near Eastern Studies is a subject which studies a great variety of sources and material remains stretching over 3000 years. Consequently it is impossible to introduce to all specialized fields of the subject equally thoroughly. Therefore in the M.A.- programme students learn the specialized basic linguistic competence and the methodological capability to make themselves familiar with a new and complex Ancient Near Eastern topic efficiently and quickly. Thus the graduate is familiar with and used to permanent learning and to develop solutions by adequate methods. In addition he/ she has good skills in modern foreign languages, by courses of the subject modules in the field of key qualifications and by Ancient Near Eastern Studies' courses. A student of Ancient Near Eastern Studies is required to read specialized literature in different languages, particularly in English, as well as in French, Italian, and Spanish, i.e. he/ she is familiar to read difficult texts in languages other than his/ her native idiom, to understand them and to gain the relevant information from them. At the same time he/ she has to express his/ her own scientific findings in German, the major scholarly language in Ancient Near Eastern Studies, in a differentiated and precise manner. So he/ she has developed linguistic flexibility and competence. Additionally, the graduate shows initiative and has the commitment to get sound information.

This module will equip the student with a knowledge of the characteristics of the Assyrian dialect. Reading texts written in old, middle and neo-Assyrian dialect, the student will also acquire an insight into topics such as long-distance trade (through old Assyrian texts from the Karum Kanis) or cult (through neo-Assyrian texts). In addition, the module will cover Akkadian texts written in a language that was influenced by a contact language.

Intended learning outcomes

The student will acquire a good knowledge of the grammatical features of the Assyrian dialect in contrast to Old Babylonian as well as of the most important monographs. He/she will acquire an overview of old, middle and neo-Assyrian texts as well as a sound basic knowledge of old Assyrian trade (goods traded, trading companies, legal forms, relations with local Anatolian authorities, organisation and functions of the karum). In addition, the student will develop a good knowledge of the peripheral Akkadian texts read. He/she will acquire a general overview of the text groups discussed as well as of the relevant academic literature. The student will also become familiar with the respective linguistic particularities.

Although Hurrian, an ancient Near Eastern language that is related to Urartian only, was widespread and culturally significant in the 2nd millennium BC, it has so far been attested in a relatively small text corpus only and has yet to be fully analysed. This module will provide an introduction to Hurrian grammar and will then move on to the reading of Hurrian texts.

Intended learning outcomes

The student will acquire an overview of the structure of the Hurrian language and especially of the criteria necessary for the analysis of forms as well as the ability to use the most important resources (grammars, dictionaries, bibliographies, text editions).

This module will introduce the student to the ancient Anatolian languages Hattic, Luwian (cuneiform and, in particular, hieroglyphic Luwian) and Urartian. At the same time, the module will equip the student with source-based knowledge of ancient Anatolian literature as well as of the history of late Hittite states and the country of Urartu in the first half of the 1st millennium BC. The Elamite language, which has no demonstrable relationship to any other known language, is attested in Southwest Iran in inscriptions from the last third of the 3rd millennium BC. Numerous ("Middle Elamite") inscriptions of the kings of Elam (residing in Susa) date from the 13th/12th century. Even in the Achaemenid Empire was Elamite the language used for administrative documents. In the first part of the course, the student will acquire an overview of the corpus and research history. The module will then move on to provide an introduction to Elamite grammar. This will be followed by the reading of several Elamite inscriptions and a more in-depth overview of Elamite history on the basis of major sources.

Intended learning outcomes

Reviewing relevant sources, the student will acquire basic Hattic, Luwian and Urartian language skills, an overview of Hattic, Luwian and Urartian tradition as well as a basic knowledge of Hittite hieroglyphic writing and will become familiar with late Hittite and Urartian history. The student will gain a good overview of Elamite tradition and will learn how to use the most important resources (corpora, grammars, dictionaries). He/she will become familiar with Elamite grammar and will be able to analyse and translate simple Elamite text passages. In addition, the student will gain an overview of Elamite history.


