The module "Regions, Spaces, Environments" provides students with specific skills to understand regional and spatial features of US-American society as well as the influence of the relation between nature and culture on processes of individual, social and national identity formation by representative examples from literature, art, film, music, philosophy and/or popular culture. This includes issues concerning the literary and cultural reflection of transnational exchange processes as well as of processes regarding cultural, political and economic globalisation.

Intended learning outcomes

After successful completion of the module, students are able to understand and evaluate literature and culture as critical forms of summarising historical and current globalisation processes, to discuss literary and cultural issues from a transnational perspective, to analyse and discuss theoretical issues concerning the spatialisation of social, cultural and political identity in the 21st century.

The course has the character of a workshop that accompanies and assists students in the process of projecting and writing their master's theses. This comprises the following concrete competencies: time management; research techniques; structuring academic writing on macro and micro levels; formulating operable research questions; fruitfully positioning oneself in relation to complex debates in literary or cultural studies; using and critically pondering scholarly concepts, methods and theories in autonomous research projects; presenting one's own research adequately in terms of methodology, conceptualization and theorization.



Topics, methods and concepts in English literary and cultural studies:

This module focuses on the topics, methods and concepts that have been central or particularly productive in English literary and cultural studies during recent decades. They also learn how to put these question, methodologies and concepts to work in autonomously dealing with texts and phenomena from the UK and the Anglophone world.

Literature and cultural practices I – The early modern period and the Enlightenment:

This module will draw on central current research questions and approaches in order to teach authors, genres and concepts relevant to the time from the beginning of the early modern period to beginning of the Enlightenment (i.e. from the early 16th to the middle of the 18th centuries). The focus is on: (1) specific developments in the literary system, in aesthetics and in the history of ideas as they were evolving through the reception or transformation of models from classical antiquity or continental Europe (classicism, humanism, Petrarchism, the Enlightenment, the discourse of sensibility); (2) historical practices of text production and reception (such as print culture and the emergence of the public sphere, patronage and the literary market, theatre and production practices, the novel and the reading public); and (3) the political and social contexts of cultural production (e.g. discourses of the nation, the Reformation and confessional conflicts, colonisation and trade, gender hierarchies).

Intended learning outcomes

By successfully participating in the module students gain a deepened understanding not only of the most important genres and the defining aesthetic developments in the literature of the early modern period, the Restauration and the Enlightenment but also of the fundamental social and political developments of the epoch. This will provide them with the competency of situating authors and texts from the early 16th to the mid-18th centuries in literary, intellectual, media and cultural history. Participants will also learn how to gauge the interdependencies between text, form, medium and cultural situation – and thus the specific cultural work of literary texts in a clearly differentiated manner and in view of the current research discussion.

Literature and cultural practices II – Romanticism and 19th century:

This module deals with literature and cultural practices from the middle of the 18th up to the end of the 19th centuries (Romanticism, Victorian period, fin de siècle). Drawing on literary and non-literary texts as well as on visual media (print, painting, photography) the courses offered within this module trace and critically reflect on the lines of development between premodern and modern times. The module allows for concretely engaging with specialized topics in this field, such as the social functions of literature and literary criticism (e.g. the condition of England novel or the cultural construction of the critic as 'sage'); conceptions of authorship and literary production (e.g. the Romantic notion of the 'poet genius' and the postulate of 'originality', the problem of female authorship, the cult of the author and the professionalization of writing, new forms of publishing); nature and industrialization (e.g. nature poetry as an early form of ecocriticism, the industrial novel and reform movements); constructions of history and the modern experience of the present (e.g. the rise of the historical novel; artworks and texts of the Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood); the transformation of gender hierarchies (e.g. the evolution of separate spheres; sexual morality and hypocrisy; deviant conceptions of femininity and masculinity); constructions of nationhood and the British Empire (e.g. the constructions and appropriations of 'Otherness' in literature and the arts, adventure novels as an instrument of empire building, literature as a vehicle of cultural domination, but also the representation of rural spaces in regional novels and regional poetry).

Intended learning outcomes

By successfully participating in the module students gain a deepened understanding not only of the most important genres and aesthetic developments in the literatures of Romanticism, the Victorian period, and the fin de siècle but also of the formative social and political transformations of the epoch. On this basis they will be able to precisely situate authors and texts from the late 18th to the end of the 19th centuries in their literary, intellectual, medial and cultural contexts. Participants will also learn how to gauge the interdependencies between text, form, medium and cultural situation – and thus the specific cultural work of literary texts – in a clearly differentiated manner and in view of the current research discussion.

Literature and cultural practices III – The 20th century and the present:

On the basis of selected texts and documents, the courses in this module discuss problems and tendencies that have characterized the literatures and cultures of the UK, Ireland and the wider Anglophone world (with the exception of the USA) since the turn to the 20th century. The goal is to critically investigate diverse constellations of literature and world or aesthetics and practice. The following topics and fields are of particular relevance: aesthetic and epistemological positions and transformations from the fin de siècle to the third millennium; convergences and oppositions between the literary system and other media systems; the cultural management of accelerating technological or socioeconomic change processes and of war or violence; the construction of memory and tradition in the field of tension between the affirmation and the erosion of national frameworks; the literary and non-literary discourses of late colonialism, decolonization and globalization.

Intended learning outcomes

By successfully participating in the module students learn how to define, use and problematize the concepts 'modernization', 'modernity' and 'postmodernism'. They gain a deepened understanding not only of the most important genres and aesthetic developments in modern and post-modern literature but also of the formative social and political transformations of the epoch. On this basis they will be able to precisely situate key texts from modern and contemporary Anglophone literatures in their literary, intellectual, medial and cultural contexts. Participants will also learn how to gauge the interdependencies between text, form, medium and cultural situation — and thus the specific cultural work of literary texts — in a clearly differentiated manner and in view of the current research discussion.

Visual, digital and sound cultures

They are also introduced to current theories in the field of visual and media analysis. Theory and current research:

This module precisely establishes and compares the fundamental strands of 20th-century literary and cultural theory. The main emphasis is on Marxist approaches, structuralism, poststructuralism, psychoanalysis, feminism, intertextuality, the aesthetics of reception, discourse theory, new historicism and cultural materialism. On this basis, the module then introduces selected approaches and debates that have shaped and transformed English Studies during the last 40 years. These will be put to use and exemplified in sophisticated analyses of concrete texts and phenomena. In the process, at least one of the following fields of research is accentuated: gender and queer studies; subcultural studies; postcolonial studies; globalization studies; performance studies; human/animal studies and environmental humanities; system theory or actor-network theory; theories of affect.

Intended learning outcomes

By successfully participating in the module students are enabled to read and understand theoretical texts and to situate them in the wider debate of literary and cultural studies. They learn to explain, critically reflect on and abstract from complex questions, models, methods, terminologies and theories in literary and cultural studies. They also learn to use these theories in their own work and research and to critically gauge their relevance and operational value.
