Course of Studies - Contents and Objectives

The BA course in Classical Archaeology aims at introducing the student to the in-depth work with selected topics of Classical Archaeology as well as the necessary methodology and providing a sound overview of the ancient Graeco-Roman culture. This requires students to acquire a solid knowledge in Latin and Ancient Greek which allows them to extract relevant information from the sources and apply it when working on ancient material remains. By training these capabilities solid foundations for a MA course are laid.

BA courses focus on the independent and critical reflection of archaeological research, methodology and creating an understanding for life in the ancient classical world. Acquiring specialised knowledge in specific branches of Classical Archaeology is conditioned by this goal.

The BA thesis demonstrates that the graduate is able to deal with a thematically limited archaeological problem within a given time according to the taught methods and scholarly standards. The graduate has accomplished this task independently but receiving professional guidance.

The BA in Classical Archaeology constitutes, within the framework of the subsequent MA, the lowest degree qualifying for a professional job, which can serve as a basis for starting professional life or as the preparation for a MA course, a different advanced training course or further training outside university.

The BA in Classical Archaeology typically aims at preparing for the work at research institutions such as universities, academies of science, the German Archaeological Institute (DAI) or museums with collections of antiques. The BA does so only indirectly by way of providing the basis for the MA and PhD, which qualify for this occupational area.

Furthermore, degree holders are provided with the skills to assume jobs outside academia, e.g. in publishing, libraries, culture management, the media, tourism, museology, public relations and diplomatic service.

Classical Archaeology is a very wide subject that deals with a range of sources and material remains arising from over 3000 years. Consequently, it is impossible to introduce students to all fields of the subject with equal thoroughness. Thus, courses concentrate on equipping the students with knowledge dealing with exemplary monuments, genres of art and various scientific challenges. Alongside this specialised basic competence, the courses provide the methodological capability to make oneself familiar with new and complex topics quickly and efficiently. Thus, the graduate is familiar with and used to permanent learning and to reach solutions by adequate methods. He / she develops a high degree of individual initiative and commitment to acquire profound factual information.

The cultures which are subject to Classical Archaeology are mainly located in the Mediterranean area. Work as an archaeologist therefore requires close relations to the countries in this area and accordingly the relevant knowledge of foreign languages. Through the respective modules as well as stays abroad (e.g. excavations, field trips, Erasmus-exchange programmes) the students acquire the ability to operate internationally. Linguistic competence is reinforced by the specialist literature which is to a great extend composed in foreign languages, especially, French, Greek and Italian. This way the students learn to comprehend complex texts in other languages and to extract the basic statements. At the same time they have to phrase their findings in a differentiated and concise German in order to apply German as the international language of science in an accomplished manner.

Contents							

In this module, the student will develop a sound basic knowledge of the Turkish language. Turkish language skills are not only important for numerous practical purposes (working with Turkish-born persons in Germany). A knowledge of Turkish, an agglutinative language, will also be of advantage when learning the Non-Indo-European languages of the ancient Near East. In addition, Turkish language skills are required for Hittitologists to be able to work in the country of origin of Hittite texts.

The student will develop a good knowledge of Turkish grammar and vocabulary. He/she will be able to participate in a simple conversation about everyday situations.
