Wissenschaftliche Befähigung

- Die Studierenden haben einen Einblick die grundlegenden Probleme, Positionen, Diskurse und historischen Strömungen in der Philosophie.

Sie haben einen Überblick über die Systematik und Disziplinen der Philosophie und über die Philosophiegeschichte erworben.

- Sie besitzen grundlegende Kenntnisse über den Aufbau und die Merkmale philosophischer Texte und der darin verwendeten Argumentationsmittel. Die Studierenden können philosophische Problemstellungen und Sachverhalte erkennen, analysieren und diese sprachlich angemessen darstellen.
- Die Studierenden besitzen die grundlegenden Fertigkeiten zur Bewertung von Begründungszusammenhängen sowie zur Reflexion auf die am Prozess der Urteilsbildung beteiligten Faktoren.
- Zudem können sie Themen und Problemfelder in übergeordnete historische, soziale und politische Zusammenhänge einordnen und sie auf diesem Hintergrund bewerten.
- Die Studierenden haben exemplarisch einen Einblick in aktuelle Forschungsdebatten – besonders in den Forschungsschwerpunkten des Institutes für Philosophie in Würzburg – erhalten.

Befähigung, eine qualifizierte Erwerbstätigkeit aufzunehmen

- Die Absolvent/innen können im beruflichen Kontext den Transfer der von ihnen erworbenen wissenschaftlichen Methoden der Philosophie (wissenschaftliche Arbeitstechniken, Bearbeitung von wissenschaftlichen Fragestellungen, Abfassung verschiedener philosophischer Texttypen, Literaturrecherche, Text- und Argumentationsanalyse, Kritikfähigkeit etc.) auf ihnen unbekannte Praxisfelder und Probleme in fremden Fachgebieten leisten. Sie sind z.B. dazu in der Lage, komplexe Themen und Texte zu erfassen, diese nach ethischen und logischen Gesichtspunkten kritisch zu bewerten und Ihren Standpunkt klar zu formulieren.

- Die Absolvent/innen können gesellschaftliche, naturwissenschaftliche, kulturelle wie auch wirtschaftliche Entwicklungen kritisch reflektieren und deren Auswirkungen auf die Gesellschaft und Umwelt erfassen. Sie besitzen die Fähigkeit, Themen und Problemfelder in übergeordnete historische, soziale und politische Zusammenhänge einzuordnen und vor diesem Hintergrund begründet Position zu beziehen.
