Wissenschaftliche Befähigung

- Die Absolventen/-innen haben einen grundlegenden Überblick über die Zusammenhänge und ein Verständnis für die Fachkultur(en) der Theologie als einem Vielfächerstudium mit enzyklopädischem Charakter.
