## Learning Outcomes

### Inhalte und Ziele des Studiengangs

Die Zielsetzung des Lehramt-Studiengangs „Philosophie/Ethik“ besteht darin, die Studierenden auf die Ausübung einer Lehrtätigkeit an Gymnasien in den Fächern „Philosophie“ (als Wahlpflichtfach in der Oberstufe angeboten) sowie „Ethik“ (in allen Stufen als Ersatzfach für den konfessionellen Religionsunterricht angeboten) vorzubereiten. Dies erfolgt durch die Vermittlung von fachlichen und fachdidaktischen Kenntnissen und Fähigkeiten sowie von weiteren persönlichen Kompetenzen, die sie dazu befähigen, in ihrem Fachunterricht Vermittlungs-, Lern- und Bildungsprozesse zu initiieren und zu gestalten, in deren Resultat die Schülerinnen und Schüler „zu werteinsichtigem Urteilen und Handeln“ (Art. 47 Abs 2 BayEUG) in individueller und gesellschaftlicher Perspektive erzogen werden. Philosophie befasst sich mit den grundlegenden Bedingungen des menschlichen Denkens, Erkennens und Handelns, den allgemeinen Strukturen der Wirklichkeit, sowie der Geschichte der Reflexion über den Menschen und die Welt. Sie analysiert die Struktur der Methoden und Ergebnisse der Einzelwissenschaften, ebenso wie ihre gesellschaftliche Bedingtheit und Relevanz. Ebenso reflektiert sie als philosophische Ethik die grundlegenden Werte und Normen menschlichen Handelns und Zusammenlebens. Gegenwärtige Positionen und Argumente müssen sich dabei im Vergleich mit konkurrierenden Entwürfen in Vergangenheit und Gegenwart bewähren. Der Bezug auf die Geschichte der Philosophie und der philosophischen Ethik dient einerseits als Prüfstein, andererseits zur Erhellung der Geschichtlichkeit und Begründungsbedürftigkeit gegenwärtiger Moral. Das Studienfach thematisiert zu diesem Zweck philosophische Positionen in Geschichte und Gegenwart sowohl in systematischer Hinsicht als auch in ihrem konkreten historischen Kontext. Daher ist die stets erneute Interpretation klassischer wie zeitgenössischer Texte und Positionen ebenso wie die Reflexion auf die Bedingungen und Strukturen historischer Zusammenhänge ein Gebiet philosophischer Arbeit, das für die systematische Auseinandersetzung mit aktuellen Ergebnissen der Einzelwissenschaften und praktischen Herausforderungen der Gegenwart unverzichtbar ist. Sofern die Philosophie und die philosophische Ethik sich als wissenschaftliche Voraussetzung individueller Lebensgestaltung sowie kultureller, gesellschaftlicher und historischer Grundorientierung verstehen, vermag die philosophische Ausbildung das Selbstverständnis von Individuen, Gruppen, Gesellschaften und Kulturen zu beeinflussen. Insofern schafft sie grundlegende Voraussetzungen zur individuellen und gemeinschaftlichen Bewältigung sich wandelnder und zunehmend unspezifischer werdender Herausforderungen des persönlichen, sozialen und beruflichen Lebens.

Nach erfolgreichem Abschluss des Studiums verfügen die Studierenden über folgende übergreifende Kompetenzen sowie die damit verbundenen Kenntnisse und Fähigkeiten:

- Vertiefte und umfassende Kenntnisse in der philosophischen Ethik, die sowohl die klassischen Werke der Ethik als auch die systematischen Grundlagen der praktischen Philosophie einschließen.
- Vertiefte Kenntnisse der Angewandten Ethik in den Bereichen Medizinethik, Wirtschaftsethik, Umweltethik, Medien- und Informationsethik.
- Exemplarische Kenntnisse aus den Bereichen Sozialphilosophie, Politische Philosophie und Rechtsphilosophie.

- Vertiefte Kenntnisse von Aufbau und Merkmalen philosophischer Textarten und der darin verwendeten Argumentationsmittel, mit besonderem Schwerpunkt auf den Charakteristika ethischer Argumentation.
- Grundlegende Kenntnisse der Religionsphilosophie und über die verschiedenen Weltreligionen.
- Grundlegende Kenntnisse der Moralpädagogik und -psychologie.
- Grundlegende fachdidaktische Kenntnisse über Modelle und Konzeptionen ebenso wie über Methoden und Medien des Philosophie- und Ethikunterrichts.
- Methodische Kompetenzen des philosophischen wissenschaftlichen Arbeitens und Schreibens.
- Fähigkeit zur Analyse philosophischer Texte und Probleme in ihrem historischen und intellektuellen Kontext sowie in ihrer Relevanz für die Gegenwart.
